

In Memory of Barbara Sewell

September 17, 1930- January 25, 2018



This year, Lebanon's Annual Town Report is dedicated in loving memory to Barbara Sewell.

Barbara was born in Boston, MA to Anthony and Eunice (Rossman) McCabe on September 17, 1930. She was raised in Reading, MA but a deep connection to Maine was formed at the age of eight when she started spending her summers in Lebanon, tending the grove at Fernald Shore with her grandmother and sisters.

Barbara graduated from Reading High School in 1949, attended Normal School teacher training, and married the love of her life, Philip E. Sewell of Lebanon, ME in 1950. They were married for 28 years before he passed away in 1978.

Though Barbara considered herself a homemaker first and foremost, she was involved in many other endeavors. She taught kindergarten in Sanford, ME for one year, assisted her husband in his land-management business, helped open a family-owned restaurant called Stokewood where she baked pies, and, for a short time, worked with a group of community members to publish a town newspaper. An accomplishment Barbara was particularly proud of occurred in 1973 when she and her husband put a conservation easement on a 450-acre parcel of land in the center of Lebanon. This land will forever remain in its natural state.

Barbara had many interests and hobbies. Always up for solving a good puzzle, one of her favorite things to do was study old deeds and walk in the woods looking for long-forgotten boundary lines. Barbara also spent countless hours sewing and knitting and loved her weekly get togethers with the Lebanon Sewing Circle, a group of ladies who, over time, set their projects aside for their favorite game, Scrabble

Barbara was a proud and active member of the Lebanon community. It was through her long-standing membership in the Lebanon Historical Society that she found the greatest opportunity to serve her town. Projects Barbara worked on included erecting bronze plaques honoring veterans of various wars, the Town Pound, the West Lebanon Village, the Ezekial Ricker Ancient Burying Ground, and the Grist Mill. She and her dear friend, Marjorie Blood, took on the task of locating and mapping what might be every remote cemetery in town and each Memorial Day, made sure all veterans had a flag on their graves, regardless of how deep in the woods they might be. One of Barbara's greatest passions was preserving the history of Lebanon for future generations. She, in conjunction with other members of the Lebanon Historical Society, helped write a collection of 18 "chapters" on the town's history and six other full-length works on the town, its history, and citizens.

Barbara is survived by her children, Nancy E. Sewell; Deborah S. Gardell and her husband Brian; Peter P. Sewell and his wife Pamela; Christopher L. Sewell; and her two daughters-in-law, Carol Sewell and Sharon Sewell. She is also survived by her sister Elizabeth Hutchins of Colorado and her brother, Robert McCabe and his wife Gay of Connecticut. Barbara also leaves behind her 12 beloved grandchildren who knew her as Grammi and 15 great-grandchildren.

In Memory of Henry Laviolette



March 9, 1929- February 17, 2018

The Town Report is also dedicated in loving memory to Henry Laviolette.

Born in Rollinsford, N.H., on March 9, 1929, he was the son of Felix and Terose Laviolette.

Henry Laviolette lived on West Lebanon Road with his wife for nearly 60 years and he cleaned it every spring, all the way from Five Corners to the corner of Upper Guinea, nearly two miles of roadway in all. Often times filling 10 bags of trash before he was done. For more than 35 years Laviolette took it upon himself to keep the section of road clean, expecting nothing in return.

In November 2017, The Select Board, along with State Rep. Karen Gerrish honored both Henry and his lovely wife, Lucinda, for all of their contributions over the years. The Laviolettes often helped out at the polls on Election Days. "This is for 50 years of service to the town of Lebanon in grateful recognition of your dedicated service," Vice Chairwoman Bragg read from the plaque. Rep. Gerrish also presented the Laviolettes with a proclamation from the state Legislature recognizing them for their 70th wedding anniversary.

The Laviolettes' love for Lebanon was evident in their attendance at Town Meeting and other civic events like Candidates Nights, which they never missed. We'll miss his warmth and sincerity and wonderful smile, and his eyes lighting up when he recognized you with a big hearty grin.

Henry is survived by his wife of 70 years, Lucinda Ann Laviolette, of Lebanon; a son Bruce and wife Moira of New Bern, N.C., their daughter; Michelle and husband Jim Dumas of Ossipee, N.H.; a daughter Brenda and partner Tom of Wilton; a son Brent and wife Nancy of Lebanon, their children Brent and wife Meagen, Lindsey and Husband Jason Morrill; and Mark and wife Heather; one sister, Edna Goodnoe, of Dover, N.H.; and five great-grandchildren.

You will also note when reading through this report, all departments are continuing to provide a high-level service to the public while striving for efficiency.

The Selectmen's Office had two brand new Selectmen elected in May and the Board has been busy ever since. The Board immediately set to work on hiring a replacement Executive Assistant to fill in the gap left by Sue Collins' retirement. Sue will be missed and we wish her well in her retirement! Her position was indeed filled by Jenny Collins, who has the skill set, energy and attitude to be a vital asset to the Select board and the Town. Jenny adds to the young professionals we have working for the Town. In fact, our own Treasurer, Jordan Miles, was featured in a Maine Municipal Association add campaign to promote young professionals discovering the opportunities in Maine's Cities and Towns. 2017 was also a chance for the Town to celebrate its 250th Anniversary!! A fabulous 4 days of events were planned by the Historical Society and the 250th Celebration committee. The Board would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to Chris Bozak, Nancy Wyman, Peggy LePage, John-Paul Cote, Tony & Laura Bragg and Jen Bozak. A lot of time and energy went in to organize and run the 4 days of event. Through their hard work and love of the Town, the residents enjoyed some good times. Our next major task was to complete assessing work for the year and collect bids for our contract assessor. Our search led us to hiring John E. O'Donnell and Assoc. as our contract assessor. The Town already had over a 40-year relationship with this firm (since 1973) as our Town Tax Mapper, so the choice was an easy fit. John spent an inordinate amount of time getting us to commitment in a timely fashion. As part of the contract assessor's contract, we will be updating our assessing system from an old antiquated non-traditional one to a more robust verifiable system. As a result, you may see John and some of his workers around Town taking pictures and measurements.

Fiscal 2017 also saw the Town leap forward into the 21st century as we upgraded our Technology in the Town and started streaming and recording all meetings to YouTube. We upgraded Town office technology systems so that we are now more secure and also have our own email addresses. Please go to our website and subscribe to our alert system for important Town information. We continue to update our website to make it an important communication tool.

2018 saw us add two more key players to Team Lebanon. First was Fire & EMS Chief Steve Merrill. After a highly qualified review Board narrowed down the applicants to two finalists, the Select board unanimously chose Chief Merrill. Steve comes to us with over 30 years of Fire and EMS experience, he's currently pursuing his degree in Fire Science, is Officer II certified and on top of that is an active Paramedic. We are excited for the leadership, knowledge, integrity and compassion that he will bring to the Team as he continues to unify the community and help expand our Paramedic service in Town.

The second key player is our new Code Enforcement Officer, Steve McDonough. Steve comes to Lebanon with over 20 years' experience, most recently as the Shapleigh Code Enforcement Officer.

The Codes office has been in turmoil for many years and so the Board is thrilled that Steve accepted our offer. He is held in high regards throughout the CEO community and his wealth of experience is something this Town so desperately needs. He's got a huge task in front of him, so be patient as he becomes immersed in the history of our CEO office.

The Comprehensive Plan Committee has been busy drafting a Comprehensive Plan. They have received back a good amount of responses to their survey and it seems almost unanimous that people agree we should have a long-term plan. A Comprehensive Plan is just that, a plan, a roadmap for what the people of Lebanon want. By itself the plan doesn't actually do anything, but it is the necessary backbone for the future changes that residents want.

In closing, we challenge everyone to take some time during the next year and make Lebanon a better place for all of us who are here now, as well as for those who move here in the future. Consider offering your services to one of the Town Boards or Committees, volunteer some time to one of the local youth programs, join one of the local service clubs that continue to improve the way of life for everyone in Lebanon. If you have any ideas on activities or changes that could improve the lifestyle in Lebanon, feel free to attend a Selectmen's Meeting and share your thoughts and ideas with us. No one has all the answers but together we can make things happen in our community. The future success of Lebanon lies in our hands.

Tax Club Application

The Board of Selectmen is pleased to announce the initiation of a Tax Club for the 2017 Fiscal Year. The Tax Club allows property owners to pay their property taxes over the course of the year through a payment book that the Town will issue once an application has been completed and the commitment set.

The Tax Club works by evenly dividing the Tax Bill into a number of payments which allows the property owner to pay monthly so long as all taxes paid have been received by June, 2018. The payments will be divided over a nine-month period starting in October and ending in June. The start date of October is used due to the setting of commitment by the Board to determine the actual taxes owed by the property owner. The payments are made without any interest charges accruing so long as the payments are received in accordance with the terms of the agreement. The agreement is written to reflect the property owner's budget. **If the property owner does not keep up with the payments, then all interest that would have been due must be paid in full.**

Any property owner who would like additional information or would like to join the tax club should fill out the attached application and drop it off at the Town Office.

RULES AND REGULATIONS: The Tax Club of the Town of Lebanon will be conducted on a payment plan approved by the Town and the individual taxpayer not to exceed 9 months in duration. Taxpayers must make payments according to the Tax Club coupon book issued to them no later than the 15th of the month in order to qualify for the "No Interest" benefit. Payments will be made at the Tax Collector's Office, Town of Lebanon, 15 Upper Guinea Road, Lebanon, ME 04027 or mailed to the same address. Payments received after the due date will be subject to paying all back interest and fees, if applicable. **It is NOT the responsibility of the Town to notify a Tax Club member of delinquent payments.**

I would like to personally thank the people of Lebanon for consistently supporting the library by approving our budget. The library is more than just a place to borrow the newest book. We are a meeting place and offer free Wi-Fi and access to the internet.

Community news is available through our Facebook page and on our bulletin board. You can take an art class, play a board game, learn about town history. We are home to many group meetings just about every night of the week. Lebanon PTO, Lebanon Historical Society, Lebanon Conservation Commission, Lebanon Festival Planning Committee and the newly formed Alzheimer's Cafe (3rd Saturday of the month from 12:30-1:30) are all ongoing meetings held at MSCL. The library was the recipient of a \$1,000 grant from the Maine State Library to fund a teenage Lego Architecture program. We also receive a quarterly grant of \$250; \$1,000 yearly from the Walmart Distribution Center in Epping, NH and their VAP program.

Coming soon is our new museum pass program. In celebration of Lebanon's 250th the library worked in conjunction with Salmon Falls Stoneware in Dover, NH to create beautiful commemorative coffee mugs and crocks. For each item purchased at \$25; \$6 was donated to the MSCL museum pass program. There are limited mugs and crocks remaining please contact the library for availability. Information about the museum passes can be found on our Facebook page.

The library was part of a combined effort with the Berwick and North Berwick libraries, and in conjunction with the MSAD 60 school system to fund a bookmobile. The Tri-Town Bookmobile (TTB) will be a wonderful resource to our town. The bookmobile became a reality with a combined \$30,000 of funding from The Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation and The Virginia Hodgkins Somers Foundation. Lebanon Fire and EMS Department

Interim Chief: Daniel Mathews

It has been my pleasure to serve as the Assistant Chief of the Lebanon Fire and EMS Department since 2015. During this time of great change for Lebanon, I have watched the department grow to a fully cross trained and staffed Emergency Response Agency. It has been trying at times, but always rewarding.

I was honored to be asked to serve as your Interim Chief after the resignation of Chief Daniel Meehan in November of 2017. I agreed to hold this position until the Lebanon Selectmen could bring on a new fulltime Fire and EMS Chief, which would continue the forward motion of this dedicated response agency.

I urge residents to continue working with the new Chief and to continue supporting the first responders in updating and renovating the aging stations, adequately equipping them, and providing a safe, healthy workplace environment.

Responses: In 2017, Lebanon Fire and EMS Responders have answered your emergency calls a total of 642 times. 25% of these calls were fire related, 75% were medical calls.

Buildings: Lebanon Fire and EMS Department has two Stations in Lebanon. Station 1, on the corner of Depot and Upper Cross Roads, and Station 2, located at 1524 Carl Broggi Highway, Route 202, in the Blaisdell Corner area.

Station 1.

Station 1 was built by local volunteers in 1978. This station contains 3 bays, office space, a full kitchen and large meeting room. In March 2016, local Code Enforcement condemned the meeting room due to a hole in the sinking concrete floor of the meeting room. During the 2017 year, it became increasingly evident that major structural repairs were needed to this building as the soil under the building was not stable. In October of 2017, Lebanon Fire and EMS moved their operations base out of Station 1. This station is owned by the East Lebanon Fire Corporation, a 501(c)3 corporation comprised of active members of the Lebanon Fire and EMS Department. Plans are being made by the Corporation to transfer ownership of the Station 1 building to the Town of Lebanon so that needed repair work can be accomplished. At this time, Engine 2, Tank 6, Utility 1 the ATV and an ambulance are housed in this station.

Station 2.

Station 2 was built by local volunteers in the 1950's. Station 2 is currently the operations base for the Lebanon Fire and EMS Department. This station has 4 bays, a watch room, 2 offices and a small meeting space on the first floor as well as a larger meeting space, and TV Room on the 2nd floor.

The 2nd floor kitchen area has been condemned and is unusable. At this time, Car 1, Tank 5, Squad 1, boat 1 and an ambulance are housed in this station.

Ambulance 1 - 2003 Ford/Horton F-450 4X4, Ambulance 2 - 2010 Chevrolet/Horton

Burn Permits: Lebanon residents can pick up a burn permit at Lebanon Station 2, located at 1524 Carl Broggi Highway: Mon - Fri 9am - 8pm. Sat & Sun 9am - 6pm. These permits are free of charge to any Lebanon resident, and are issued on Class 1 & 2 days, as directed by the Maine Forest Service. Burn permits are also available for purchase via the State of Maine website. Go to <http://www.maine.gov/dacf/mfs/> to purchase a permit.

Seasonal permits are granted to residents for campfires only and can be obtained free of charge. To obtain a seasonal permit, residents must make an appointment for the fire area to be inspected by the Chief. The fire pit must be no more than 30 inches in diameter with a non-combustible material in a ten-foot diameter completely encircling the pit. Charged water supply access must also be available with enough hose to completely circle your burn area. If residents are interested in obtaining a seasonal campfire permit, please call Station 2, Mon - Fri 9am - 8pm and Sat & Sun 9am - 6pm to request an appointment with the Chief by calling the station at (207) 457-6556.

American Red Cross Blood Drives: During 2017, Lebanon Fire and EMS has assisted the American Red Cross by hosting 5 blood drives at Station 2 with the Bloodmobile. Each pint of donated blood has the ability to help three victims of serious accident or devastating illness. During 2017, Lebanon Fire and EMS Blood Drives helped to provide the American Red Cross with 80 pints of blood, with the capability to help save 240 lives!

Toys for Lebanon Kids Program 2017: On December 2, 2017 the Fire and EMS Department, hosted a spaghetti supper to benefit the Toys for Lebanon Kids program at the Riverside Grange #475 on Little River Road. Many local businesses donated raffle items and residents donated gift cards and new unwrapped toys, and when the event was over, the supper and raffle had raised over \$700 to help with the purchase of gift items for our local families in need. Extra thanks go to Pastor Mark Foster and the congregation of the North Lebanon Second Baptist Church who donated an additional \$500 toward this project.

Lebanon Fire and EMS Support personnel offered help to families during the 2017 holiday season, providing toys and gifts to 33 families containing 76 children between the ages of infant and 16 years of age.

Moving Forward: As Lebanon Fire and EMS moves into the 2018-19 Fiscal Year, our responders are more dedicated than ever to providing speedy, competent and reliable emergency services to the residents of the Town of Lebanon.

There have been many changes in our department in 2017 as growth, education, dedication and team building became a focus for our responders. We look forward to continuing to grow with Lebanon in 2018, 2019 and beyond.

We are a department of 30 members, currently Station 2 is manned from 6am – 10pm Monday through Friday, and from 6am – 6pm on Saturday and Sunday. During the time that the Station is not physically manned, there are members who are responsible for covering the overnight shift from their homes, living within minutes of the Station for first response to any emergency you might encounter. We feel confident in saying that our team provides excellent coverage for emergencies 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

We are pleased to share the following successes of our department members in 2017:

4 of your responders graduated Fire Academy and became certified as Firefighter 1 & 2.

5 of your responders obtained licensure at the EMT level.

4 of your responders upgraded their licensure to the Advanced EMT level.

3 of your responders were certified as Fire Instructors.

The fund is administered by Maine Health Care at Home. Applicant must be 65 years of age or older, have a financial need at or below 175% of Federal Poverty level, and be residents of Lebanon Maine. General Assistance

General Assistance is an emergency assistance program regulated by state statute and municipal ordinance. The program is designed to provide Lebanon residents with assistance for basic needs for housing, utilities and food. All assistance is granted in voucher form and no cash assistance is granted. Prior to making an appointment, an individual should pursue other sources because General Assistance is intended to be a program of last resort. The state reimbursement rate is 70% and the Town receives 100% reimbursement. The General Assistance Office is open for appointments on Mondays from 8am to 12pm. A brief summary of your Conservation Commission's 2017 activities include:

- Advised the Planning Board about soils suitability on proposed development site
- Maintained liaison with Milton's 3 Ponds Protective Association regarding control of the European Naiad infestation
- Instructed summer day camp youngsters in invasive plant identification
- Participated in the annual Lebanon Day activities
- On Arbor Day in April we planted a lilac next to the town office.
- Gully Oven Natural Area was a concert venue during Lebanon's 250th celebration.
- Guest speaker Dr. Owen Grumbling, chair of the Wells Conservation Commission discussed management of town-owned lands at a public meeting at the Library.
- Issues concerning public access along Hebo-Hybo road were favorably resolved.
- We continued the study of town-owned lots suited for conservation and recreational activities.
- Our members met with the Acton Conservation Commission to discuss topics of mutual interest.

European Naiad Control in 2017

A Success Story

“The program to control the invasive plant European Naiad in the summer of 2017 appears to have been successful.” This was the punch line of TPPA (Three Pond Protective Association) president Norm Turgeon’s report to the Lebanon Board of Selectmen last November.

The news of European Naiad’s discovery in Northeast Pond in August 2015 was alarming, Invasive aquatic plant experts from both Maine DEP (Department of Environmental Protection) and New Hampshire DES (Department of Environmental Services) warned that this rapid growing invasive plant could, if left uncontrolled, eventually cover the Three Ponds bottom and render the Ponds useless for boating, swimming and fishing. Both State agencies warned that eradication of the invader would be difficult, and could take many years, possibly generations.

Working with ME DEP, NH DES, and TPPA, a Steering Committee from Lebanon and Milton developed an action plan for controlling the European Naiad starting in the summer of 2016. The main focus in this first year was on removing as many of the plants as possible, from a large dense infestation on the northeast end of Northeast Pond, by commercial divers and a DASH (Diver Assisted Suction Harvesting) boat. Funding in 2016 (\$30,000) came totally from ME-DEP and NH-DES. Results were disappointing, less than 40% of the dense infestation was removed. All parties involved concluded that the only effective way to control large dense infestations was to apply herbicides.

So, the action plan for 2017 was to apply the herbicide Diquat over the 41-acre infestation in Northeast Pond and remove plants with DASH elsewhere on Northeast and Depot Ponds and the connecting River. The funding plan was to use a combination of town appropriated funds from Lebanon and Milton, grant funds from ME-DEP and NH-DES, and TPPA funds. Lebanon residents voted to appropriate up to \$6,600. We received good news that grant funds from ME-DEP far exceeded expectations, and so Lebanon’s and Milton’s share of the \$35,578 total cost was \$2,027 each. TPPA also contributed \$2,027. The rest (\$29,497) came from State grants. Post-removal surveys conducted in September confirmed the effectiveness of the 2017 plan. Only small groups of European Naiad plants were observed – not surprising since seed beds continued to germinate after the removal process in mid-July and early August.

We hope that next summer’s growth will be less than this year’s, and that this declining trend will continue in future years. Time will tell. The plan for 2018 is to remove plants with DASH wherever they are found. ME-DEP is not planning to apply herbicides as they believe DASH will be effective. Estimated cost for DASH, based on inflation and increasing the area to include 41-acres treated with herbicides in 2017, is \$30,000. We will be asking Lebanon voters to appropriate funding again in 2018. The only municipalities who have been successful in controlling invasive aquatic plants are those who have an active Lake Association and Towns willing to contribute funds for the project. State agencies that award grants are more inclined to support communities like ours who help themselves.

Dear Noble Community Members,

We continue to close the gap toward our district literacy goal: *85% proficiency or better on the STAR reading assessment by Spring, 2018*. School leaders and literacy coaches are doing a phenomenal job at setting the standards of instructional practice, conducting strong staff professional development to demonstrate what best practice literacy instruction looks like, and supporting teachers to embed that practice into their daily instruction. By example, NMS Literacy Coach Elyse Galeucia runs the Literacy for the 21st Century model classroom, in which teachers observe practice in a clinical setting and discuss the implications for their classrooms of the observed practices, and Elyse follows up those sessions with classroom assistance and coaching. Thanks to such efforts, we are seeing consistent progress toward our district goal.

This year, we are revisiting the District Strategic Plan, originally established in 2009. The District Vision/Mission/Values have been reestablished, thanks to the hard work of about a dozen work groups and the Board of Directors over the past four months. The Vision for MSAD #60 Schools is:

Inspired Learners – Empowered Citizens

The revised Mission is:

We empower all students to develop enthusiasm for learning, foster confidence through successes and failures, provide service to others, and achieve their personal, social, and academic best, leading to fulfilling and engaged lives for all.

The Core Beliefs and Values are still under construction. New or refined *DRAFT* Strategic Goals are as follows:

Focus Area One - Foundations for Success, such as: each student has access to mental health and wellness services; asset development (i.e., self-worth, grit, endurance, tolerance, service to others, and acceptance); substance abuse training and character education

Focus Area Two - Pathways to Success, such as: Multiple Pathways; Personalized Learning Plans;

Extended Learning Opportunities; Career and Technical Education; and [Redefining Readiness](#)

Focus Area Three - Community Success: Our students belong in the community and Our community benefits from our students

Focus Area Four - Healthy and Safe Schools Support Success: Regional Alliance for Healthy Foods and Clean Facilities co-op; 21st Century Learning spaces

Concerning school finances, the Maine Department of Education (MDOE) is scheduled to release preliminary subsidy reports on February 1. School subsidy will continue to be a difficult, moving target this winter and into the early spring, as the Legislature deals with potential adjustments during session. Of note, the political debate concerning subsidy amounts continues. As of last July, the Legislature approved

last minute legislation requiring districts to participate in regional service centers for such services as: Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Business Manager, Human Resources, Payroll, Bookkeeping, Special Education Director, Transportation, Food Service, and others. The MDOE released information about service agreements and our District agreed to participate in the application process, but the subsidy interpretation has shifted dramatically (as much as \$570,000 decrease from the October MDOE information release). As I noted, state subsidy remains a difficult, moving target. I will keep you updated about that via: Town Meeting, local town municipal budget presentations, the District Annual Report, and televised Board meetings. At the federal level, Title 2 professional development funds have been discontinued, so we are figuring out how to replace that funding loss.

Facilities and Transportation continue to be major budget focus areas. Noble Middle School is targeted for continuing upgrades to support 21st Century Learning. The plan is to focus on places like: the administrative wing, library, chorus area, locker rooms, and classroom pod center areas. Asbestos abatement will continue as well. For the short-term investments at that school over the last three years, we believe we will change the facility into a strong physical plant to extend the life of the school another 30 years.

Lebanon Elementary School is a different matter. The structure is physically safe, but long-term investment would be imprudent for the wooden structure. We are investigating potential future state building subsidy, but the State currently has a ten-year list of commitments. Also, in Lebanon, we have plans to add a cottage - similar to what was built in North Berwick – to alleviate space issues at Hanson.

Two other schools need space issues addressed in the near future. The Town of Berwick has substantial home expansion plans, and Hussey School is close to capacity at this time. We are considering a wing expansion over the next two to three years. Finally, North Berwick Elementary School has inadequate office, nursing, storage, and conference room space. A relatively inexpensive expansion of the entrance area would resolve those pressures.

In closing, we are on the move! We continue to make progress academically, and we are ensuring the learning and working conditions represent district values, use, and pride. Please join us during the budget process and school happenings, so that you may hear more about the information presented in this letter.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lebanon, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2016 and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the Table of Contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Town's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that Management's Discussion and Analysis, the Schedule of Proportionate Share of Net Pension Liability, and the Schedule of Pension Contributions be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the *Governmental Accounting Standards Board*, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with evidence sufficient to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements. The accompanying supplementary information appearing on pages 38 through 39 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing

procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

As management of the Town of Lebanon, Maine, we offer readers this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016.

A. OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the basic financial statements. The basic financial statements comprise three components: (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements, and (3) notes to financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-wide financial statements. The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of our finances in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The Statement of Net Position presents information on all assets, liabilities, and deferred outflows/inflows of resources with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities presents information showing how the Town's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused vacation leave).

Both of the government-wide financial statements distinguish functions that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (business-type activities). The governmental activities include general government, public safety, education, public works, solid waste, human services and culture and recreation.

Fund financial statements. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. Fund accounting is used to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds can be divided into two categories: governmental funds and fiduciary funds.

Governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements,

governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a government's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

An annual appropriated budget is adopted for the general fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with this budget.

Fiduciary funds. Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of parties outside the government. Fiduciary funds are not reflected in the government-wide financial statements because the resources of those funds are not available to support the Town's own programs. The accounting used for fiduciary funds is much like that used for proprietary funds.

Notes to financial statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

Other information. In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain required supplementary information which is required to be disclosed by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

B. FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- As of the close of the current fiscal year, the total of assets exceeded liabilities by \$7,496,981 (i.e., net position), a change of \$763,198 in comparison to the prior year.
- As of the close of the current fiscal year, governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$3,086,640, a change of \$828,313 in comparison to the prior year.
- At the end of the current fiscal year, unassigned fund balance for the general fund was \$2,434,538, a change of \$885,982 in comparison to the prior year.
- Total long-term debt (i.e., capital leases) at the close of the current fiscal year was \$33,625, a change of \$(32,867) in comparison to the prior year.

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. At the close of the most recent fiscal year, total net position was \$7,496,981, a change of \$763,198 from the prior year.

The largest portion of net position, \$4,066,713, reflects our investment in capital assets (e.g., land, buildings and improvements, machinery and equipment, vehicles, and infrastructure), less any related debt used to acquire those assets that is still outstanding. These capital assets are used to provide services to citizens; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. Although the investment in capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.

An additional portion of net position, \$545,254, represents resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used. The remaining balance of unrestricted net position, \$2,885,014, may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.

Governmental activities. Governmental activities for the year resulted in a change in net position of \$763,198. Key elements of this change are as follows:

The food pantry in conjunction with The York County Shelter is open. This will provide vital services to those who suffer from food insecurity. York County is proud to be a partner in this endeavor.

The Layman Way Recovery Center is on track. The Recovery Center is aimed at treating the many addictions that folks suffer from. Planning is going well and with the help of the budget committee we are anticipating an opening on April 1.

In conjunction with the Sexual Assault Response Services of Southern Maine (SARSSM) York County opened the Child Advocacy Center of York County. This is a vitally important service to children who have suffered sexual abuse and trauma. This group is housed in the courthouse basement.

To the Community we serve:

The Maine State Police-Troop A, is located at 502 Waterboro Road in Alfred, Maine. The State Police barracks consists of a troop commander, three sergeants, three corporals, one troop detective and ten troopers who provide law enforcement services for five towns in York County (Alfred, Dayton, Hallis, Lebanon and Lyman). Lieutenant Ross was the Internal Affairs / Professional Standards Sergeant prior to his promotion. He has been with the State Police over 15 years where he patrolled and worked as a detective in York County for the first half of his career. Lieutenant Ross had previously served with the Portland Police Department and the New York City Police Department.

Also within the confines of the Troop A barracks are detectives with the Maine State Police Major Crimes Unit, Maine Warden Service and the Maine Fire Marshal's Office. All members of the Troop work closely with these units to provide assistance and support when needed.

The State Police bring several other resources to the law enforcement and public safety platform for the town of Lebanon and surrounding communities. The State Police Specialty Teams are the best in the state and include a Tactical Team, Evidence Response Team, Underwater Recovery Team, Bomb Team, Air Wing, Canine Team, Crisis Negotiation Team and the Incident Management Team (handle large scale events). In addition to Specialty Teams the State Police Commercial Vehicle Unit has several Troopers assigned to the York County area which will assist patrol units when necessary.

During 2017 the State Police covered a total of 1982 calls for service in Lebanon. This is an increase of 19 calls from the previous year.

In general, the overall trend in criminal activity for Lebanon is down or relatively flat, this is attributed to the methodology conducted by Troop A to reduce crime and disorder activity. The area of most concern is the opioid epidemic that is afflicting New England including the State of Maine. We are seeing more serious drug violations and are expecting there will be continued problems in this area. Fortunately, the attention this issue is receiving from our state and national representatives should assist with our collective efforts to combat this recent threat to our communities.

Troop A was able to augment patrol coverage for Lebanon during 2017 with the use of special traffic details for OUI, distracted driving, seatbelt, and speed enforcement. We also continued to partner with our surrounding police agencies to assure that collaboration and information sharing is maintained as an important part of our investigative and preventative efforts for Lebanon.

The Town of Lebanon should also be aware that Troop A now has two canine officers, three troopers on the State Police Tactical Team, one drug recognition technician, one negotiator and one firearm instructor. We also have a number of troopers that are highly skilled in a number of other areas not the least of which is crisis intervention for persons suffering from mental illness.

During 2017 the State Police, Troop A continued to work with the Selectpersons, community and businesses of Lebanon to assure several annual events were conducted in a safe, successful manner. The collaboration with all entities involved is a good example of assuring the public's safety through cooperation and community partnerships. Working together will assure the upcoming year will reflect our best efforts to keep Lebanon safe.

Dear Citizens of Lebanon:

For the past seven years as your Governor, my priority has been to make Maine—our people—prosper. Helping you keep more money in your wallet by reducing taxes has been part of that mission.

Too many Maine families are facing skyrocketing property taxes that strain household budgets. Our elderly on fixed incomes are particularly vulnerable to these increases. School budgets are often blamed for annual increases in property taxes. But there's another reason. A tremendous amount of land and property value has been taken off the tax rolls, leaving homeowners to pick up the tab.

As of 2016, towns and cities owned land and buildings valued at nearly \$5.5 billion statewide. Large and wealthy non-profits, such as hospitals and colleges, often escape paying property taxes on their vast real estate holdings—totaling more than \$5.1 billion statewide.

In Maine, nearly 2.5 million acres of land have been set aside for conservation by the federal and state governments and non-profit organizations, including land trusts. Municipalities are losing out on property taxes on an estimated \$2 billion in land that has been either removed from the tax rolls or prohibited from development—shifting the cost of municipal services to local homeowners through higher property taxes.


It's time to recognize the results of taking property off the tax rolls and identify solutions to reduce the burden on our homeowners. My administration's proposals have been met with staunch resistance.

In 1993, about 35,800 acres of land were documented as land-trust owned. That number has increased by an astonishing 1,270 percent. Land trusts now control over 490,000 acres with an estimated value of \$403 million. We must restore the balance. We will be working this session to ensure all land owners are contributing to the local tax base. It's time for them to pay their fair share.

I encourage you to ask your local officials how much land in your municipality has been taken off the tax rolls, as well as how much in tax revenue that land would have been contributing today to offset your property taxes.

A Message from Senator Ron Collins

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

I would like to thank you for the opportunity to represent you in the Maine Senate. It has been an honor to work on your behalf to make our state an even better place to live, work and conduct business.

On August 2, Maine lawmakers finally adjourned for the year, after what proved to be the longest session in recent memory due to a brief government shut down over budgetary disagreements. While no state budget is ever perfect, the end product was a state budget that makes a record investment in our students, supports our communities and will tremendously benefit small businesses and our economy.

Perhaps the most significant action the Legislature took last year, as part of the biennial budget, was the removal of the burdensome, job-killing surtax that was already hurting small businesses, doctors and other professionals that we so critically need. In November 2016, voters sent a clear message that education funding was to be a priority of the 128th Legislature, and we heard that message loud and clear. However, the funding mechanism which was included in the measure – the surtax – presented a serious threat to the state's economy. This new tax gave Maine the ominous distinction of being the highest-taxed state in the country and primarily impacted small businesses, which are the backbone of our economy, taxing them at a rate that is higher than larger corporations are subject to pay. I am proud to say that after much hard work and negotiating, thanks to our rebounding economy, we were able to support our local schools at a level we have never been able to before – without any additional taxation.

The Homestead Exemption, which provides much-needed property tax relief for homeowners, was also preserved in the budget with an increased exemption of \$20,000.

The Legislature also passed a measure to make Maine compliant with the REAL ID Act. As a result of this important new law, the federal government has granted Maine a waiver, meaning that Maine citizens can continue to use their driver's licenses to board commercial airplanes and access certain federal buildings.



While we accomplished much, there is still a lot of work ahead of us next session. Again, thank you for putting your trust in me to represent you in Augusta. Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from this past year.

Maine has the oldest average age in the nation. As Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities for the Committee are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security. Following the Committee's investigation into skyrocketing prescription drug costs, I authored bipartisan legislation to foster generic competition, which was signed into law. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for seniors to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. To support the 40 million family caregivers in the United States, I am proud to have authored the RAISE Family Caregivers Act to create a coordinated strategy to support family members who make countless personal and financial sacrifices to care for their loved ones.

The opioid crisis touches families and communities across our state. As a member of the Appropriations Committee, I fought for significant increases in funding to support community, law-enforcement, and public health efforts. In April, the State of Maine was awarded over \$2 million to fight this devastating public health crisis. Additionally, I have authored legislation to support grandparents and other extended family members who are raising grandchildren as a result of the nation's opioid epidemic.

Biomedical research has the potential to improve and save lives, and also supports good jobs at research facilities here in Maine. Last year, the Appropriations Committee approved a \$2 billion increase for the National Institutes of Health for the third consecutive year. This includes an increase of nearly 30 percent for research on Alzheimer's, our nation's most costly disease. As founder and co-chair of the Senate Diabetes Caucus, I work to raise awareness of the threats posed by diabetes, invest in research, and improve access to treatment options. My bill to establish a national commission of health care experts on diabetes care and prevention was signed into law in 2017.

We owe our veterans so much. Last year, I worked to secure the authorization of a Community-Based Outpatient Clinic in Portland to support the health care of Maine's veterans in the southern part of our state. I also worked to secure funding extensions to help veterans throughout rural Maine receive health care within their communities. I also worked to secure funding for housing vouchers for veterans to reduce veterans' homelessness.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard for construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen our national security and preserve great jobs in our state.

As chairman of the Transportation and Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I worked to increase funding for the TIGER program that has provided Maine with more than \$122 million for vital transportation projects. For housing, I worked to provide \$160 million to help communities protect children from the harmful effects of lead poisoning.

Growing our economy remains a top priority. I supported the comprehensive tax reform bill because it will help lower- and middle-income families keep more of their hard-earned money; boost the economy; and encourage businesses, both small and large, to grow and create jobs here in Maine and around the country. This legislation contains key provisions I authored that are important to Mainers, including preserving the deduction

for state and local taxes, expanding the deduction for medical expenses, and enabling public employees such as firefighters, teachers, and police officers, as well as clergy and employees of nonprofits, to make "catch-up" contributions to their retirement accounts. I led the effort to ensure that the tax cut will not trigger automatic budget cuts to Medicare or any other programs.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As of December 2017, I have cast more than 6,500 consecutive votes, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

The Lebanon Post of the American Legion was formed and received a Charter as Post 214 in 2007. We continue to seek out and encourage local veterans to join us in continuing to serve by supporting others veterans and our local community. We currently have post membership of about 50 members; however, there are many more eligible veterans in town and the surrounding area. Currently we meet at 6:30 PM, the second Wednesday of every month, in the First Parish Congregational Church function hall. If there are any veterans who wish to join the post, they should contact one of the post members or officers (listed below) to discuss eligibility requirements and to assist them in joining. Our organization is dedicated to assisting veterans and making a positive contribution in our community. We have been involved in town activities from Memorial Day Ceremonies to Veterans Day events and many other events throughout the years. Post 214, with the assistance of the Historical Society, helps with upkeep and places American flags on Veteran's graves in all Lebanon Cemeteries. We also serve as a collection point for old and unserviceable U.S. Flags to ensure they are disposed of respectfully. Collection boxes are located in the town office and post office.

Post 214 has an active role in the Lebanon community by supporting local sports teams and youth organizations. We are the sponsor organization for several Scouting organizations in town. Some other examples of our involvement are the "Trunk or Treat" event, where candy is given out at Halloween and donations to the town office for those in need during Thanksgiving and Christmas. We are also involved in town cemetery projects where cemeteries are cleaned of debris. In order to support some of these events, the post has to raise money. We also hold yard sales and raffles from time to time. The post uses the CLYNK Program where we collect returnable cans and bottles; these funds are donated to the Sanford Veterans Center where they are used for veterans in need as well as other post needs. Additionally, the post has recently started an Air Rifle Marksmanship Club where the members practice marksmanship, enjoy friendly competition and comradery.
