ANNUAL TOWN REPORT FOR JULY 1, 2013 TO JUNE 30, 2014



The Lebanon Academy was founded in 1849 by Rev. Oren Burbank Cheney, D.D. the first principal, who later founded Bates College and the Rev. David B. Cowell who gave the land and the first money. It remained a substantial school of higher learning until its closing in 1942. A few years ago the dwindling Academy Alumni Association decided they needed to find someone or group to shoulder the responsibility for the care and maintenance of the property and building, and turned the property over to the Union Freewill Baptist Church. However, the church has struggled to maintain both properties, so it decided to establish a Board of Directors that would take responsibility to set up its own account and manage the property separately. After several meetings the board set some project priorities to paint the exterior back wall of the building and repair and paint the belfry. Estimates have been received and now funds need to be raised. If you're interested in helping the Lebanon Academy be restored and maintained, please contact the Union Freewill Baptist Church.

Aside from serving the town, Larry also enjoyed showing his steers at Maine fairs and spending time in the hayfields during the summer. He was an avid outdoorsman who loved hunting and fishing with family and friends plus his snowmobiling trips. Larry was a family man – father, brother, son and to many a great friend.

It was with great sadness that Larry left us on February 14, 2015 at the age of 62, but he leaves behind a legacy of honesty, friendship and love for our little town. The town of Lebanon will treasure Larry in its memory forever.

October 1, 1935 – June 22, 2014

Ethel was born in Lebanon, ME on October 1, 1935 to Howard and Madeline (Maxfield) Patch. She attended Rochester, NH schools graduating in 1953.

On October 23, 1953 she married Ernest Lizotte and they shared 60 years of marriage. In 1959 they bought their first home, a farm in North Lebanon. They raised 5 children and 1 foster son. The family grew to 17 grandchildren and 17 great grandchildren, which she described in her 57th year high school reunion bio as "a very rewarding experience and super fun during the holidays".

Ethel enjoyed living a simple life, hunting, gardening, spending time with friends and family. She was always ready to help and enjoyed participating in town parades, celebrations and events. In 1967, she designed and crafted the Lebanon Bicentennial Flag for the 200th year anniversary celebration. That same year she became a member of the North Lebanon 2nd Baptist Church, teaching Sunday School, Youth Groups and Awana for more than 40 years.

In the 1980's, Ethel joined other town citizens to fight CMP's spraying of harmful herbicides, resulting in today's "no spray ordinance". When a special waste landfill was proposed to the town, she again joined others to stop it. She served on many town boards and committees.

Ethel served as Tax Collector from 1993 to 2000. As Tax Collector, she also worked with the implementation of the E-911 addressing system. When she retired as Tax Collector, she became Lebanon's E-911 Coordinator.

Ethel passed away on June 22, 2014 at the age of 78. She will be remembered for her dedication to make Lebanon a better town for future generations. She will be dearly missed by all who knew and loved her.

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REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Dear Fellow Resident:

The Town of Lebanon has faced many challenges this past year. One of the greatest issues which affect us all is our eroded undesignated fund balance. Undesignated fund balance contributes to the cash flow of the Town and should amount to the equivalent of three months worth of Town expenditures which include school payments and county tax. An eroded fund balance has created a low cash flow which severely limits the amount of funds available to spend on departmental budgets at each new fiscal year which begins July 1st until tax revenue begins to come in around the middle of September, and also just before tax payments are received in April.

There are many reasons why we find ourselves in this position. One has been the lack of understanding and proper oversight of the Town's finances in the recent past. Examples of this include the lack of oversight of the Town's Rescue Department expenditures, and paving of roads using undesignated fund balance without a required Town vote approval rather than using monies that were budgeted, raised and appropriated for that purpose. Another example is using fund balance to keep the mil rate low by applying it to the tax commitment, which although approved by Town vote, was irresponsible at the time and helped to hide the fact that the Town's Rescue Department was not supporting itself as was being reported and was in fact eroding away our fund balance which helps maintain our cash flow in the general fund.

The Contingency fund is used to cover unforeseen expenditures within the Town. In the past, some departments were allowed to over spend with very little oversight. The Board has taken many steps to avoid budgetary overages and to enact fiscal controls by the implementation of a purchase order policy for all department expenditures. At this time, due to the critical fiscal position of the Town, the Board reviews and approves both the amount of the expenditure requested by each department head and the budgetary account line from which the requested amount will be expended. Upon approval of the purchase order, the department head orders the requested item and produces a bill which has first been signed off by the department head, then the Town Treasurer, and then finalized upon review by the Board of Selectmen.

It is through considerate management that the Town's funds are improving. September of 2013 we were in a position of needing to borrow \$1,000,000.00 for that month by using our annually established line of credit known as a TAN (Tax Anticipation Note). The following March 2014 we needed to utilize the TAN in the amount of \$300,000 until taxes were collected the following month. With careful monitoring by the Treasurer and the Board of Selectmen, we have not needed to use any amount of our line of credit for the past year. This past September 2014 and March 2015, the operating funds of the Town hovered between \$30,000.00 and \$60,000.00 respectively just before property tax monies were received.

We continue to maintain a balance between ensuring that proper expenditures are made within the departments to move forward, build the undesignated fund balance, and to keep taxes as low as possible based on what the Town votes to raise and appropriate. This is a long term project and needs to be continued indefinitely.

This past year we have also seen Route 202 repaved by Maine Department of Transportation. The process was an interesting one as many watched a machine, nicknamed "The Dragon" by many, melt the existing pavement, reprocess, and relay it down as the sub layer with a finish coat then applied. Some concerns have been brought forward to MDOT by the selectmen and discussed with Maine State Troopers. We hope to see these items addressed this next summer. One identified issue is the passing lane from STS Construction to Brian's Brake and Muffler which many feel should be a solid double line to avoid any more accidents on the top of that hill. The Board has expressed concerns with the lack of visibility over the hill heading west if one was to attempt passing. The Board feels that this area should be a solid double yellow line allowing for no passing, but ultimately will be a decision made by MDOT.

In January, long time Fire Chief, Skip Wood's resignation was finalized upon the hiring of his replacement. The Board of Selectman thanks former Chief Wood for his many years of service to our Town. The Selectmen hired Daniel Meehan from Rochester, NH as the Town's Fire Chief on January 15th. Rescue Chief Jenny Sheriff submitted her resignation to the Selectmen due to personal reasons unrelated to the changes within the Town on January 17th. Upon receipt of the Rescue Chief's resignation, the Selectmen saw a great opportunity to combine both the Rescue and Fire departments' operations while being legally obligated to keep their financial budgets separate.

Great progress has been made within both departments in many areas under Chief Meehan. One improvement has been building a roster of a greater number of licensed individuals. Many members who were once only qualified to drive or support personnel are now in class to obtain their EMT-Basic. Others within the Rescue department are continuing to advance their licensing to EMT-Advanced in order to provide better professional service to our community.

We continue to repair and improve our mutual aid relationships with surrounding towns. Rescue calls are being covered regularly by a dedicated group of on-call licensed volunteers

which has helped to improve the relations between Lebanon and its surrounding communities. The Town will continue to move forward and rebuild our departments to a level that not only look good from the outside, but will now also be strong from the view of our mutual aid providers and Maine Emergency Medical Service in regard to state licensure.

Chief Meehan and Selectman Thompson recently met on May 11th with Rick Martin, the president of Comstar which is our medical billing company. It was a pleasure to be allowed to view the inner workings of how the process of billing works for our benefit. We had a few questions which were readily answered, and we also negotiated to lower the billing fee which Comstar charges for their service.

A Town vote on January 24th called due to a citizens' petition to save our 2004 ambulance was fruitful in that regard and also provided for the full payoff of that ambulance. The Rescue enterprise account created in 2010 was also voted to be shut down effectively upon the new fiscal year, July 1, 2015. The effect of that vote allows for the development of a tax appropriated budget for the Rescue Department.

We, the Board, thank you for your support throughout the last year as we are honored to serve you to the best of our ability. We surely could not cover all the events of the past year within the confines of this letter. We strongly urge residents to come in to view our meetings which are currently held on Mondays and Thursdays, beginning at 4pm until at least 7pm. LEBANON AMERICAN LEGION POST 214

Veterans Serving Veterans, Our Community and Country

The Lebanon Post of the American Legion was formed and received a Charter as Post 214 in 2007. We continue to seek out and encourage local veterans to join us in continuing to serve by supporting others veterans and our local community. We currently have post membership of about 50 members; however there are many more eligible veterans in town and the surrounding area. Many veterans may not even know Lebanon has its own post, and that is one of the reasons we are placing this letter in the Town Report. Currently we meet at 6:30 PM, the second Wednesday of every month, in the First Parish Congregational Church function hall. If there are any veterans who wish to join the post, they should contact one of the post members or officers (listed below) to discuss eligibility requirements and to assist them in joining. Our organization is dedicated to assisting veterans and making a positive contribution in our community. We have been involved in town activities from Memorial Day Ceremonies to Veterans Day events and many other events throughout the years. Post 214, with the assistance of the Historical Society, helps with upkeep and places American flags on Veteran's graves in all Lebanon Cemeteries. We also serve as a collection point for old and unserviceable U.S. Flags to ensure they are disposed of respectfully. Collection boxes are located in the town office and post office.

Post 214 has an active role in the Lebanon community by supporting local sports teams and youth organizations. We are the sponsor organization for several Scouting organizations in town. Additionally, we have sponsored the Books for Bikes Program with the elementary school and town library. Some other examples of our involvement are the "Trunk or Treat" event, where candy is given out at Halloween and donations to the town office for those in need during Thanksgiving and Christmas. We are also involved in town cemetery projects where cemeteries are cleaned of debris. In order to support some of these events, the post has to raise money. One of the primary fundraising methods we use is our spaghetti supper held at the function hall at First Parish Congregational Church on Center Road on the second Saturday of every month. We also hold bake sales, yard sales and raffles from time to time. The post uses the CLYNK Program where we collect returnable cans and bottles; these funds are donated to the Sanford Veterans Center where they are used for veterans in need.

The license fee is \$11.00 for unaltered dogs and \$6.00 for neutered/spayed. We registered 1004 dogs last year. **New this year you can license your dog online at www.maine.gov/dog_license.**

Resident, non-resident hunting, fishing and archery licenses are available at the town office. Report for Town Report

From Chief Constable Charles H. Denault Jr.

Over the past several years, The Town of Lebanon Maine has been trying to combat the excessive amount of residents who register their car in another State. The fees associated with this act are lost and ultimately the residents and the State of Maine are hurt by the lack of collecting these yearly reoccurring fees.

Many people who commit this crime do not pay excise taxes, license their dogs, obtain Maine drivers licenses or most importantly fail to pay income taxes. Many violators do not have vehicle insurance and put others at risk. Since most accidents happen 6 miles from where you live, many of Lebanon's residents are at risk for financial burdens from property damage or personal injury from the uninsured.

The town of Lebanon and Selectwoman Karen Gerrish began working with me in 2009 and in May of 2012, after I had retired from the Kittery Maine Police Department as a Sergeant, approached me with a plan of enforcement. In August of 2012, we began building the system to enforce these violations and get those who choose to register in another State to comply with Maine's law and register their cars here. There are only two exemptions allowed by law, active duty military and those attending colleges in a full time status and even business vehicles are not exempt.

Registrations are not limited to resident's vehicles; they are required for business vehicles, boats, campers and trailers and include ATV vehicles. In the summer of 2013, we worked with the Maine Criminal Justice Academy and were recertified to enforce all Maine laws with the primary focus on Registration Laws. In June of 2013, \$14,000 dollars was voted to fund the position. Out of that budget and as of May31st and based on a streamlined approach, our total expenditures was \$

I began by developing a commercial, flyers and business cards to educate the public with the reason for the enforcement and our mission. We worked with the Maine State Police who patrol Lebanon and the Bureau of taxation. I began January 1st, 2014 with the enforcement. The response has been impressive, there are a lot of genuinely nice people in Lebanon who registered their cars and obtained Maine driver's license once confronted and many had complied based on the advertising. The assistance with the newspapers and online article, help minimize the prosecution and prevented needless court time.

The average amount of time to process and patrol was about 4 hours a week. Follow up phone calls and time not charged to the Town which averaged about 2 hours a week. In order to keep the budget low, a cost effective approach to the enforcement was tried and proved to be successful. The average contacts were 4 potential violations per hour. Keep in mind, when I am on registration patrol, there is an extra set of eyes on the roads of Lebanon.

During the actual six months of physical enforcement, Lebanon had almost a 90 percent compliance rate for those who were required to register and not those visiting or exempt. Based on statistics there were x amount of new registrations this years and many people added to the tax payer roles as a result.

Keep in mind, that the ones who complied will reregister in the future years with a continuing payment of excise taxes to the Town yet new violations will still continue to filter into Lebanon and therefore the need to enforce is still prevalent.

I feel the program worked and keeping it extremely cost effective, the excise taxes brought in could clearly self-fund the program. Thank you for the opportunity to make a difference and letting me serve you.

LEBANON, ME FIRE DEPARTMENT

JULY 1, 2013 – JUNE 30, 2014

LEBANON FIRE PERMITS

Permits are required at all times for any outside fire. Permits are issued as the weather permits and as directed by the Maine Forest Service. MFS announces a class day during fire danger months at about 9:30 am, the classes run from 1 (low) to 5 (extreme) fire danger, permits are only issued on class 1 + 2 days, and sometimes on a low three if the burner can show ample means of controlling the burn.

Permits are normally issued for 1 day only and to 12 pm or a time that is stated on permit, fire must be completely out at that time, permit holder is to be with burn at all times and must have control of it.

Proof of ownership of land and/or a letter from owner giving permission to have fires on the property

Brush and clean wood are the only items that a fire permit can be issued for, no man made products or rubbish.

No stumps or logs over 5" in diameter are allowed in a one day permit

Permits will not be issued to anyone who has not obeyed all the open burning rules of the State and/or Lebanon in the past

Incinerators are Not Permitted in Lebanon. Open burning only.

Requirements for a Seasonal Camp Fire

Seasonally camp fire permits can be issued; these are for “Cooking and Warming Fires” only. The fire pit will be no more than thirty inches in diameter, and a ten foot diameter of noncombustible material or mineral soil around the pit. The area overhead should be cleared; a charged water line will be on site at all times when fire is present with enough line to completely circle the fire. All other standard fire permits regulations will be followed.

Camp fire permits can be issued from January to December as long as area is maintained and all burning rules are followed. No burning on any time that a standard permit is not allowed, time, class day etc.

The area will be inspected before a camp fire permit will be issued, contact the Fire Warden; Skip Wood to arrange inspection.

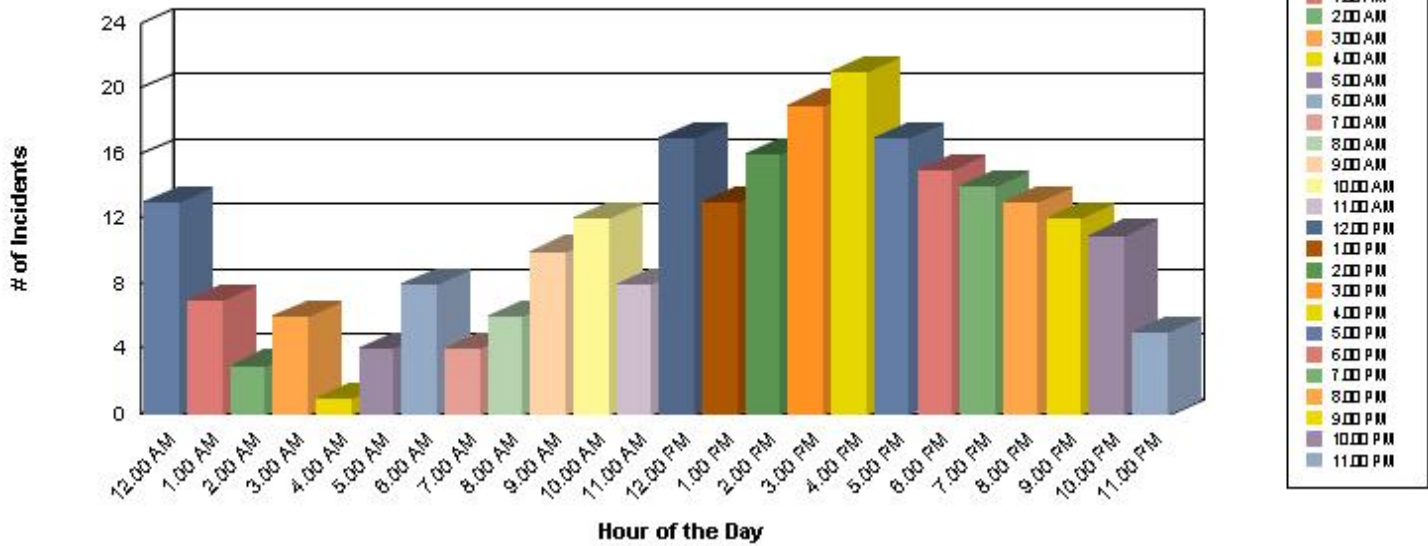
Fire pit in a 10 ' noncombustible zone at a safe distance from any structures, for cooking and warming only no debris burning. Burning from 10 AM to midnight on class 1 & 2 days, on low class 3 days in the evening after 5 PM if weather conditions are favorable with little or no wind.

A low class 3 would occur when one of the zones (1 and 3) for Lebanon is a 3 and the other is a 2

Always use common sense when burning if conditions do not appear to be favorable do not burn.

A seasonal camp fire permit can be obtained for the year. Area must be inspected once the snow is gone and the pit is clear of debris and ready to use. Notify the Town Fire warden, Skip Wood by e-mail woodsab@metrocast.net or chiefwood@metrocast.net ; by phone at home 207-457-1242 that the area is ready to be inspected.

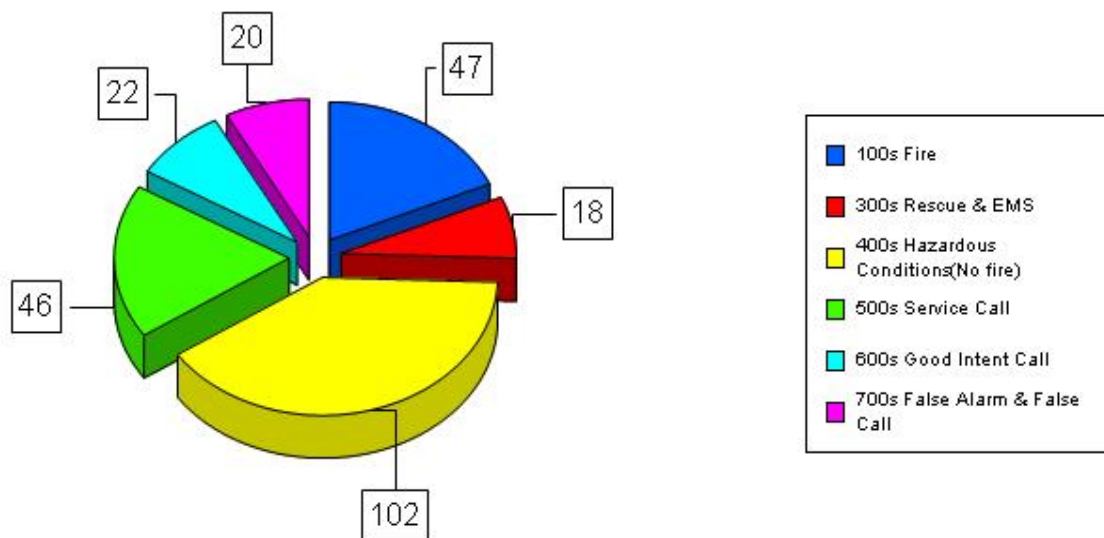

Lebanon Rescue Department

FY 2013-2014

The Lebanon Rescue Department endured a nearly disastrous upheaval during the 2013/14 fiscal year. For years some members of the Town's Budget Committee had questioned the financial standing of the Lebanon Rescue Department's enterprise fund. Many financial questions had gone unanswered even by the Town's independent auditors. An experienced Treasurer was hired toward the beginning of the fiscal year which begins on July 1st. As time went on, several issues were being slowly discovered which often led to more questions which needed answers. By October of 2013, the financial status of the Rescue Department was revealed to be expending more funds than it was receiving. Constraints were put in place as issues continued to be discovered within management of personnel, state licensing, patient care, as well as the many financial problems that were laid out to the public during the December 5th meeting held at the Hanson school.

The Rescue Department enterprise fund, voted into existence in 2010, required that the department was to only expend revenue received which was typically received from ambulance transports. However, it became abundantly clear that the Rescue Department was not only spending all of the revenues received, but also overspending based on expected revenues not received yet, known as, receivables. It is understood that all ambulance transport units are affected by a certain percentage of disposition (uncollectible revenues) due to deaths, lawsuits, old or absent billings, out of state Medicaid, and other various reasons. Historically, this percentage for the Town of Lebanon's Rescue Department has been 40%.

Clear patterns emerged which showed that the Rescue Department was not only overspending during this fiscal year, but had been spending more than was received each year since the inception of the enterprise account in 2010. The department began the enterprise fund with a town approved rollover in the amount of \$88,406.69. The revenues produced fiscal year 10/11 were reported to be \$192,546.81. The expenditures that year within the department, which included a new ambulance, accumulated to \$348,511.99 which left the department in debt that year in the amount of \$67,588.49. This debt was borrowed from the Town's undesignated fund balance without a Town vote to pay expenses incurred by the Rescue Department. Fiscal year

11/12 reports revenues received in the amount of \$127,610.30 and expenses in the amount of \$145, 836.40 which rolled the debt of the department that year to the accumulated borrowed debt of \$85,814.59. Fiscal year 12/13 reports revenues received in the amount of \$63,557.22 and expenses in the amount of \$145, 205.07 which rolled the debt of the department that year to the accumulated borrowed debt of \$167,432.44. Fiscal year 13/14 maintained this similar pattern and reports revenues received in the amount of \$66,225.12 and expenses in the amount of \$95,086.64 which rolled the debt of the department that year to the accumulated borrowed debt of \$196,293.96. This debt had been consistently used from the Town's undesignated fund balance which requires a passing vote of the Town in order to expend. This had not been done.

January 1, 2014 found the department being managed by a new Interim Chief in regard to the operational duties, and all enterprise funds were being directly managed within the Town Office. Revenues and expenses were consistently being closely monitored. Upon the Treasurer's recommendation the Board of Selectmen split revenues and expenses within the department as "old Rescue" and "new Rescue". This action allowed for the proper crediting of all received revenues and expenses incurred before January 1st to the "old Rescue", and all new revenues and expenses to the "new Rescue".

Interim Chief Ray Parent led the "new" Rescue Department as it struggled to answer calls. The first issue for the new chief was to clean up the Blaisdell Corner Station. Individual licensing issues were addressed to bring our personnel up to the required standards. Cohesiveness of a group of volunteers was difficult to maintain as loyalties were split in a similar manner as the Town residents. Several personnel issues were addressed, and slowly but surely a stronger team was emerging.

The biggest obstacle faced at that time was the existing debt of "old" Rescue combined with the lack of revenues due to unattended dispositions and late billings which left "new" Rescue trying to maintain service to the Town with absolutely no funds due to ambulance revenues may be slow to receive due to several previously mentioned reasons.

Town and department management was also faced with the possibility of losing its standing with Medicare due to the proper paperwork not being filed. The Selectmen and Town Treasurer worked closely with Comstar billing company to overcome this potential tragedy and was reinstated after six months of diligent follow up.

As fiscal year 14/15 approached, Interim Chief Parent expressed his interest to return to retirement and to give more attention to his family and personal life. Upon the new fiscal year Chief Jenny Sheriff licensed as an EMT-Paramedic was hired after the interview process.

We as a Town should be sure to thank the small group of extremely dedicated on-call volunteers who have continued to maintain and secure our Rescue Department. Without their dedication and hard work at all hours of the day, we would not be able to maintain a medical service to the Town. Thank you for all you do for us!

Martha Sawyer Community Library Annual Report - 2015

Dear Lebanon Residents,

This year has been a busy year at the Martha Sawyer Community Library. We now have 668 individuals and families with library privileges at MSCL. This year 4,549 books, movies and ebooks were physically borrowed from the library. Another 389 were borrowed through the inter library loan partnerships with libraries in Maine and throughout the country.

The library was the recipient of a \$10,000 grant from the Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation. A portion of the grant was to improve the existing shelving and add new shelving in the library. The bulk of the grant was to boost our book holdings in the Young Adult and Adult areas of the library. We are very grateful for this very generous grant to the library and our town. Lots of changes at the library were able to be accomplished due in large part to this grant.

In conjunction with the STK Foundation grant; we received additional funding and donations from Walmart, Kennebec Savings Bank and Best Buy of Newington. A combination of all these funds and donations allowed us to reconfigure the library. There is now a dedicated study corner in the Young Adult section, complete with a 42 inch TV mounted to the wall. New shelving houses more than 450 new books that were purchased through the STK Foundation grant. Previously stadium seating dominated the back corner of MSCL. It has been replaced with benches with storage below for our soft cover and board book collections. We have added blocks, legos, weebles, little people and trains for our little ones to play with. We also have puzzles, checkers and chess for our slightly older kids. Come and see all the changes for yourselves; you may not recognize the space.

We continue to host many community activities at the library for our patrons. The Summer Reading Program theme this year was "Dig into Reading". We had a record number of participants and enjoyed exploring science based learning linked to reading books. In making these books come alive we broke open geodes, had an archeological dig, created pictures with sun sensitive paper and created foaming sidewalk chalk masterpieces. Look for information for the upcoming Summer Reading Program. This program is designed for children ages 7-12. Sign ups will begin June 15th.

The Martha Sawyer Community Library also hosts community meetings. We have ongoing scheduled meetings every month for the Lebanon Historical Society, the Planning Board, the Conservation Commission, the Frontier Girls and the Lebanon PTO. If your group would like to host a series of meetings or just a one time meeting at the library please contact me for available dates and times.

As always I am open to suggestions on community events you would like to see at the library, new books you would like to add to our collection or any input you have about MSCL. This library is the community's library. YOUR library. **Be a part of it!**

Dear Town of Lebanon,

It is with great pleasure that I present the following yearly overview of the Maine State Police's activities in your community for 2014. Lebanon is a relatively heavily populated community with over 6,000 citizens contained within its borders which hold a land mass of 55.8 sq. mi. The Town is surrounded by larger communities which possess a commensurate increase in public safety issues which affect the more rural community of Lebanon. The major highway of Rt. 202 runs through the community linking Sanford and Rochester N.H. together. These circumstances all present unique challenges to policing your community.

The Maine State Police developed and implemented an operational plan when we took over as Lebanon's primary law enforcement agency. The foundation of the plan is to work collaboratively with the community to address crime and disorder, to identify areas of criminal activity, and then to utilize appropriate resources and tactics to eliminate the unwanted behavior. Resources are always a salient issue for public safety and by identifying "hot spots" and tackling them, the collateral affect reduces criminality and disorder in the broader community. During the year of 2013 there were 40 burglaries in Lebanon. During 2014 that number dropped to 33. Motor vehicle thefts dropped from 7 in 2013 to 2 in 2014. Proactively, The Maine State Police arrested 46 persons on criminal warrants, a figure that is up from 41 in 2013. In 2014 we charged 40 persons with operating after license suspension and in 2013 that number was 38. The State Police is aware that when there is a problem in your personal neighborhood that is a priority for you and also needs to be addressed in a meaningful manner. Therefore, I am also happy to explain that by addressing repetitive and recidivistic activity we have also greatly reduced crimes of disorder (less serious crimes) in specific communities. For example, noise complaints dropped from 20 in 2013 to 15 in 2014, and in the general catch all category of "citizen requests for assistance" the number dropped from 297 in 2013 to 230 in 2014.

The serious issue of persons in mental health crisis has also been addressed with an innovative approach by the State Police. This progressive approach is a collaborative effort with mental health providers to assure each person suffering from mental illness obtains the services they require. In 2013 we responded to 12 mental health crisis calls and in 2014 that number was reduced to 4 calls.

The recent increase in narcotic abuse in Maine, specifically heroin is a challenge to both law enforcement and the community. Unfortunately, the State Police responded to too many calls

either directly or tangentially associated with this activity in 2014. To address this deadly activity the Maine State Police works collaboratively with the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency, and the US Drug Enforcement Agency, as well as the surrounding police departments to share information, identify trends and suspects and then respond appropriately and swiftly.

The Town of Lebanon has enjoyed additional traffic enforcement by the State Police by receiving the benefit of state wide initiatives to address traffic concerns such as, OUI enforcement details, seatbelt enforcement details, speeding enforcement details, and distracted driving enforcement details.

The Maine State Police responded to 2105 calls for service in Lebanon during 2014. During 2013 we responded to 2096 calls in Lebanon, effectively maintaining a flat level of calls which is a positive indication that our efforts are effective, taking into account the reduction in serious crimes. This overall reduction increases our ability to take part in proactive enforcement which in turn generates more numbers, however, of a different nature and level of seriousness.

Throughout 2014 the Maine State Police worked with town businesses to ensure annual events are conducted in a responsible and safe manner and to ensure mutual success. The State Police regularly meets with the fire and rescue department to address any concerns and maintain our good working relationship. We also regularly meet with Town government to work collaboratively and address any matters of concern. The development of excellent working relationships assures continued progress and increased public safety for the community. The State Police looks forward to the following year and continuing our collaborative work with the town of Lebanon. Challenges lay ahead, however, together we will ensure that the Town of Lebanon remains a safe and peaceful community.

The year 2014 was a busy and as usual a productive year for York County.

We added key staff when we hired our first-ever Human Resource Director. Not only will this enhance our organization capacity in dealing with employee issues, it will also bring some much needed oversight to the various leave and benefit programs offered by the county.

For some time the county had been considering options for the former home of our Emergency Management Agency (EMA). This building had been vacated when the renovations to the former jail were completed. By chance we learned that the York County Food Rescue had been evicted from their location. The result is that the County Government has provided a rent free facility to a critical program that serves all of York County, which is in keeping with Commissioners goal to provide or aid in the delivery of programs that benefit the entire County.

Our other major change in York County Government was the conversion to July –June fiscal year. Building upon prior changes, this conversion drastically alters the County's cash flow resulting in \$100,000 in savings. Under our previous fiscal year, January-December the County has to borrow money to fund operational expenses.

With this change the County no longer borrows any money to fund operational expenses.

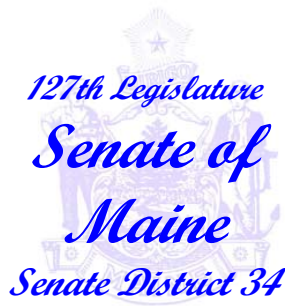

I am deeply honored to serve you and will continue to work to bridge the partisan divide and to forge bipartisan solutions to the many challenges our nation faces. With the New Year just beginning, I welcome this opportunity to reflect on some of my work from this past year and to highlight some of my priorities for the year ahead.

The biggest challenge facing our State remains the need for more jobs so that Mainers can stay in our great State to live, work, and raise their families. Since small businesses create the vast majority of jobs, we must help them to start up, grow, and succeed. We must update our tax code to encourage small business investment in equipment and other assets, cut the red tape that is hampering job creators, build the transportation and energy infrastructure to support an expanding economy. We must also foster opportunities for key industries, from agriculture to defense. We must ensure that our workers have the skills they need for the jobs of today and tomorrow. These initiatives will remain my top priorities in the new Congress.

I am pleased to report a number of successes from this past year, including provisions from my “Seven Point Plan for Maine Jobs.” My proposals to streamline job training programs and better match workers’ skills with employers’ needs were enacted as part of a workforce investment act. I helped secure promising manufacturing opportunities for our state—from requiring the military to buy American-made athletic footwear for new recruits, just as it does for other uniform items, to an additional Department of Energy investment in the deepwater, offshore wind power project being developed by the University of Maine, Maine Maritime Academy, and private companies. For Maine agriculture, I succeeded in including the fresh, white potato in a federal nutrition program from which it has been the only vegetable to be excluded.

Also last year, I was pleased to join in the christening of the *USS Zumwalt* at Bath Iron Works, a Navy ship for the 21st Century that will help protect our nation and strengthen one of Maine’s most vital industries. And, for Veterans living in rural areas, I secured a two-year extension of the successful Access Received Closer to Home program, which is improving access to health care for Veterans in northern Maine. Finally, after several years in the making, I am delighted that Congress has approved my legislation to form a commission – at no cost to taxpayers – on the creation of a National Women’s History Museum. A museum recognizing the contributions of American women is long overdue, and this bill is an important first step toward that goal.

In the new Congress, I will serve as Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee. This position will allow me to continue working to ensure investments are made in critical transportation infrastructure, which is essential for our safety and economic growth. To date, Maine has received more than \$90 million for highway, bridge, airport, rail, and port projects through the successful TIGER grant program.

I will also serve at the helm of the Senate Special Committee on Aging in the 114th Congress, a position I sought because Maine has the highest median age in the nation. Working to address pressing issues facing our seniors, from long-term care and retirement security to the vast potential of biomedical research, will be on our agenda. Preventing and effectively treating Alzheimer’s should be an urgent national priority as this devastating disease continues to take such a personal and economic toll on more than five million Americans and their families. The Committee will also continue to focus on the scams and frauds targeting our senior citizens and has a toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) where seniors and their loved ones can report suspected fraud.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2014 ended, I continued my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997; a tally that now stands at more than 5,700 consecutive votes.

Maine has a great tradition of civil involvement and citizen participation in the decision making process. Thank you for taking the time to become informed.

In the fall of 2011, a prominent national business magazine published a business climate ranking that put the country on notice that Maine is the toughest state in our nation to grow a business and create jobs. As a result of our challenging business climate, our per capita income is just 80 percent of the national average.

One of my top priorities for getting Maine moving is regulatory reform. The objective is a cooperative approach to how the State and municipalities work with the private sector rather than a weakening of standards or oversight. This is why I have created a new "Certified Business Friendly Community" program which is geared towards helping towns reduce red tape, and work with our job creators.

Dear Noble Community Members,

I am pleased to have the opportunity to address you in the town report.

Our students continue to outperform state and national averages. While we are glad to see positive data, we are still not satisfied with these results. We are in year two of our district-wide focus on literacy and have established rigorous benchmarks for student growth as judged by our STAR data. Our goal is: **85% of our students will demonstrate proficiency on the STAR reading assessment by Spring, 2018.** We continue to implement strong best practices in literacy instruction, to offer quality literacy professional development to staff, and to observe and critique those practices in our classrooms. All staff receive feedback on literacy across the content areas.

We continue to develop a strong curriculum with guidance from: K-12 Common Core State Standards curriculum units in English and Mathematics, Next Generation Science Standards curriculum units, and the Maine Learning Results curriculum in 5 content areas. We are also meeting the state requirement to provide Proficiency-Based Graduation requirements at Noble High School and will continue to bring this initiative to Noble Middle School next year.

A district Teacher and Principal Evaluation Task Force has been meeting regularly throughout the year and is making great strides towards the creation of an evaluation system aimed at improvement for all staff as measured through student growth. The system we are developing will meet all requirements of state statute as well.

As noted in last year's letter, MSAD #60 has eight schools: Noble High and Middle Schools, Mary Hurd Academy, North Berwick Elementary, Vivian E. Hussey, Eric L. Knowlton, Hanson and Lebanon Elementary Schools. The district Central Office is located on the second and third floors of North Berwick Town Hall. The Transportation Department is located adjacent to Noble High School. Our main structures vary in age with Noble High being most recent (2001) and Mary Hurd Academy being the oldest (1949).

We have a multi-year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) aimed at ensuring our facilities are conducive, safe, and appropriate places in which learning may occur. There are a few areas of major focus in our CIP, for example: replacement of univents at North Berwick Elementary (summer 2015), Knowlton (2016), and Hanson (2017), and Hussey (2018). Noble High School will also receive an HVAC improvement so that all systems may be operated remotely. Security and technology continues to evolve, as we are upgrading camera systems and facility access.

As always, it is imperative we maintain a safe Transportation fleet. The State of Maine has approved additions to and subsidy for our fleet. We will gain three large buses that will all have specialized built-in seating for four year olds. We will add two small buses and seek to cycle out some of our Special Education buses that meet and are beyond state replacement guidelines. Currently, more than a quarter of our fleet

meets those guidelines (over 10 years old and 200,000 miles). It continues to be important moving forward that we work to re-establish a reasonable fleet replacement cycle, as difficult economies over the past few years have caused us to push off replacements.

MSAD #60 continues to operate one of the leanest administrative structures in Southern Maine, due to our consolidated or reduced administrative services with other districts. While this model has resulted in savings to district taxpayers, there will be additional challenges in 2016-2017 that we will need to address. The new evaluation system will likely cause many districts to reinforce classroom observation and feedback practices.

Our district continues to provide quality Special Education Services to over 500 students with identified disabilities. Due to the creation of an in-district placement option for students with significant need – the Mary Hurd Academy – we are able to provide better services and have more control over out-of-district placement costs. Our district has reduced the number of out-of-district placements to twelve students. This number includes medically fragile cases. We also continue to develop alternative, regular and special education programs to further support the needs of our students. At Noble High we offer: Multiple Pathways, Team 5, Hawks 8, Exceptional Studies, and Exceptional Studies II.

In closing, on behalf of the students and staff of our district, I wish to thank the Noble communities for their support of our schools. As a reminder the Town Meeting will be held on the evening of May 7 at Moore Gymnasium at Noble High and the public vote will be on May 12, 2015.

TAX CLUB

The Board of Selectmen is pleased to announce the initiation of a Tax Club for the 2015 Tax Year. The Tax Club allows property owners to pay their property taxes over the course of the year through a payment book that the Town will issue once an application has been completed and the commitment set.

The Tax Club works very similar to a Christmas Club account in that your tax bill is evenly divided over the year into a number of payments that the property owner chooses so long as all taxes paid have been received by June 15 of the fiscal year. In most cases, the payments would be divided over no more than a ten month period starting in September and ending in June. The start date of September is used due to the setting of commitment by the Board to determine the actual taxes owed by the property owner. The payments are made without any interest charges accruing so long as the payments are received in accordance with the terms of the agreement. The agreement is written to reflect the property owner's budget. If the property owner does not keep up with the payments, then all interest that would have been due must be paid in full.

Any property owner who would like additional information or would like to join the tax club should fill out the attached application and drop it off at the Town Office and someone will contact you to finalize your application.

RULES AND REGULATIONS: The Tax Club of the Town of Lebanon will be conducted on a payment plan approved by the Town and the individual taxpayer not to exceed 10 months in duration. Taxpayers must make payments according to the Tax Club coupon book issued to them no later than the 15th of the month in order to qualify for the "No Interest" benefit.

Payments will be made at the Tax Collector's Office, Town of Lebanon, 15 Upper Guinea Road, Lebanon, ME 04027 or mailed to the same address.

Payments received after the due date will be subject to paying all back interest and fees, if applicable. It is **NOT** the responsibility of the Town to notify a Tax Club member of delinquent payments.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lebanon, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2014 and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the Table of Contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Town's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies

used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lebanon, Maine, as of June 30, 2014, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof and the respective budgetary comparison for the general fund for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that Management's Discussion and Analysis and Schedule of Funding Progress be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the *Governmental Accounting Standards Board*, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with evidence sufficient to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements. The accompanying supplementary information appearing on pages 38 through 39 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the

auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

As management of the Town of Lebanon, Maine, we offer readers this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2014. **All amounts, unless otherwise indicated, are expressed in thousands of dollars.**

A. OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the basic financial statements. The basic financial statements comprise three components: (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements, and (3) notes to financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-wide financial statements. The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of our finances in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The Statement of Net Position presents information on all assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities presents information showing how the Town's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused vacation leave).

Both of the government-wide financial statements distinguish functions that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (business-type activities). The governmental activities include general government, public safety, highways and streets, sanitation, economic development, and culture and recreation. The business-type activities include ambulatory rescue activities.

Fund financial statements. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. Fund accounting is used to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds can be divided into three categories: governmental funds, proprietary funds, and fiduciary funds.

Governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a government's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

An annual appropriated budget is adopted for the general fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with this budget.

Proprietary funds. Proprietary funds are maintained as follows:

Enterprise funds are used to report the same functions presented as business-type activities in the government-wide financial statements. Specifically, enterprise funds are used to account for ambulatory rescue operations.

Proprietary funds provide the same type of information as the business-type activities reported in the government-wide financial statements, only in more detail. The proprietary fund financial statements provide separate information for the ambulatory rescue operations, which is considered to be a major fund.

Fiduciary funds. Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of parties outside the government. Fiduciary funds are not reflected in the government-wide financial statements because the resources of those funds are not available to support the Town's own programs. The accounting used for fiduciary funds is much like that used for proprietary funds.

Notes to financial statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

Other information. In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain required supplementary information which is required to be disclosed by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

B. FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- As of the close of the current fiscal year, the total of assets exceeded liabilities by \$6,375 (i.e., net position), a change of \$277 in comparison to the prior year.
- As of the close of the current fiscal year, governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$1,688, a change of \$42 in comparison to the prior year.
- At the end of the current fiscal year, unassigned fund balance for the general fund was \$1,126, a change of \$74 in comparison to the prior year.
- Total long-term debt (i.e., capital leases) at the close of the current fiscal year was \$75, a change of \$(35) in comparison to the prior year.

- Bi-annual Property Taxes are Due 10/15/15 and 4/15/16
- Snowmobile & ATV Registrations Expire June 30th
- Boat Registrations Expire December 31st
- Hunting & Fishing Licenses Expire December 31st
- Dog Licenses are Due December 31st and a late fee will be assessed after January 31st
- Property is assessed each year to the owner of record as of April 1st. Property tax bills are mailed to the owner in September.
- Annual Town Meeting: 2nd Tuesday in June from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm, Lebanon Elementary School
- Primary Election, even years: 2nd Tuesday of June from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm, Lebanon Elementary School
- General Election: 1st Tuesday of November from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm, Lebanon Elementary School
- School District Budget Meeting & Budget Validation Election: To be determined by the School Board (usually held in the month of May)

WHAT TO BRING WHEN REGISTERING A VEHICLE:

Re-Registration: Your old registration, current insurance card & mileage.

New Registration (Dealer Sale): Proof of sales tax paid (this is usually found on the financing statement), blue title application form, window sticker (if new vehicle), current insurance card & mileage.

New Registration (Private Sale): Bill of Sale, title for vehicles 1995 or newer, insurance card & mileage.

New Registration (Transfer): Same as private sale registration above PLUS registration of the vehicle the plates are being transferred from. This vehicle must no longer be owned by you in order to receive excise tax credit.

WHAT TO BRING WHEN REGISTERING A SNOWMOBILE/ATV/BOAT/CAMPER:

Re-Registration: Old registration.

New Registration (Dealer Sale): Proof of sales tax paid (this is usually found on the financing statement), ME assigned number on used rec. vehicles.

New Registration (Private Sale): Bill of sale, ME-assigned number and serial number. Horsepower and length for boats.

New Registration (Transfer): Same as private sale above PLUS registration of the vehicle the plates are being transferred from.

WHAT TO BRING WHEN LICENSING A DOG:

Current rabies certificate and neutering/spay certificate (must be sealed original from the vet).
