Tom Potter was born and raised in the Boston, Massachusetts area. For four years, he was in the communications field with the United States Navy. For 21 months, he took part in monitoring the Russia fleet which was operating in the Black Sea. Following his time with the Navy, he attended and graduated from Tufts University where he met his wife, Barbara. In 1958, they moved to Lebanon, where Tom and his brother, Brewster, operated a dairy farm. In 1967, they sold the herd to concentrate all their efforts on Potters Place Campground. Tom became sole owner in 1973, and for the next 40 years, devoted himself to making the campground unique (adults/couples only) and beautiful. Tom was a 57 year member of the Springvale Masonic Lodge.

His service to the town included interim road commissioner in the late 1980's and participation for several years on the Lebanon budget committee and planning board. He served 2 terms as a Lebanon selectman. Tom loved Mother Nature, and was happiest on his tractor, always trying to improve the land he loved. His three kids, their spouses and the 6 grandchildren were the most important parts of his life. He was a happy "transplant" to Maine.

REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

We appreciate having served the Town for another year, and we would like to thank all of the residents, employees and volunteers for their time as well. We are pleased to work with such a dedicated group of people.

In the last year and a half we had almost a complete turnover of the office staff. Mandy Grenier resigned as Town Clerk, and her position was filled by Dale Fisk who was originally hired as Mandy's deputy. Rebekah Thompson was then hired to replace Dale as her full-time deputy. Dale and Rebekah work together alongside part-timer Kathleen Peterson to take care of the front office. Sue Collins retired as the Selectmen's secretary after 11 years of service to the Town of Lebanon. As of right now, she is being replaced by part-timers. Treasurer Jeannette Lemay also resigned her position for the Town and she was replaced by recent University of Southern Maine graduate, Jordan Miles. We are hoping to have a full staff by August 1st.

Last year all of the mobile homes in Town were reassessed, and this year the entire waterfront in Town was reassessed. We have high hopes that the next thing to be assessed will be all of the businesses in Town. This past year the assessing was done with the help of Assessing Agent and former Selectman Ben Thompson.

The Board is pleased that we went through the entire year without the need to borrow any money.

The Board is also pleased to announce that this is the first year that all of the Town Reports will be assembled in house, and this will ensure that we only make what we need.

This past year we have also had some upgrades to roads in Town. Shapleigh Road was finished with pavement, and River Road was also paved from North Rochester Road down to the bridge. A large section of Lower Barley Street was also repaved. We are hoping to continue the paving of our town roads this year.

It has been an absolute pleasure for us to serve the Town this year, and we hope to continue our work to make Lebanon better for all of the residents. Once again, we would like to thank everyone for their support, and we are looking forward to the future and to watching Lebanon grow.

Over the past year, the department has seen growth in membership and cross training of members to better serve the community.

Training is a big part of the growth in the department, with medical personnel becoming interior certified pro-board Firefighters and Firefighters becoming Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians.

A few of the Department's Basic EMT's have continued their medical training and will be testing out for Advanced EMT certificates.

Many members have obtained their Pumps 1 certificate and passed an Emergency Vehicle Operating Couse, both courses carry college credits and were free to the department.

Quite a number now have valuable additional certifications in topics ranging from medical water rescue and vehicle stabilization technicians, to working on rural water supply techniques and incident management skills.

1 Captain and 3 Lieutenants are currently in an Instructor 1 & 2 course.

In 2016 Maine EMS granted Lebanon's Ambulances an upgrade to Paramedic.

Over the past year, the department has answered 610 calls, most of the calls being medical calls, having people covering at the station on Upper Cross Road has improved response time and serving the town.

Presently the Station is covered with 2 personnel Monday – Friday from 6am-10pm, weekends 6am-6pm and nights are covered from home.

The Department continues to support the American Red Cross by holding regular blood drives at Station 2 on Carl Broggi Hwy.

The 2016 Toys for Lebanon kids campaign was a huge success, 32 families were helped. Some 75 children from Lebanon had special gifts under the tree on Christmas morning. Cindy Harmon and Deborah Wilson worked many hours to make it a huge success. Members: Matt O'Connor, Jenna Cole, and Jon Kinney, also helped sorting, bagging and staging items.

MSCL is a space for reading, studying, tutoring, storytimes (while school is in session – Saturday at 11:00 and in summer Tuesday at 12:30), crafts, classes, speakers, meetings, author visits and signings, book fairs, fun and community. We have a meeting space that can be reserved for your group during our regular hours. No reservations needed for meeting up with your friends to play in our children's area (little people, trains and blocks are very popular) for those with older or grown kids bring your knitting or just yourself and chat with your friends.

MSCL is thankful for the ongoing support from Walmart Distribution Center of Epping, NH and their VAP program that donates \$1,000 per year to the library. To the Community we serve:

The Maine State Police-Troop A, is located at 502 Waterboro Road in Alfred, Maine. The State Police barracks consists of a troop commander, three sergeants, three corporals and nine troopers who provide law enforcement services for five towns in York County. Lieutenant Ross was the Internal Affairs / Professional Standards Sergeant prior to his promotion. He has been with the State Police over 14 years where he patrolled and worked as a detective in York County for the first half of his career. Lieutenant Ross had previously served with the Portland Police Department and the New York City Police Department.

Also within the confines of the Troop A barracks are detectives with the Maine State Police Major Crimes Unit, Maine Warden Service and the Maine Fire Marshal's Office. All members of the Troop work closely with these units to provide assistance and support when needed.

The State Police bring several other resources to the law enforcement and public safety platform for the town of Lebanon and surrounding communities. The State Police Specialty Teams are the best in the state and include a Tactical Team, Evidence Response Team, Underwater Recovery Team, Bomb Team, Air Wing, Canine Team, Crisis Negotiation Team and the Incident Management Team (handle large scale events). In addition to Specialty Teams the State Police Commercial Vehicle Unit has several Troopers assigned to the York County area which will assist patrol units when necessary.

The Maine State Police is pleased to present the following annual report of our activities for 2016.

During 2016 we covered a total of 1963 calls for service in Lebanon. We are happy to advise that this is a reduction of 18 calls from the previous year.

In general the overall trend in criminal activity for Lebanon is down or relatively flat, this is attributed to the methodology conducted by Troop A to reduce crime and disorder activity. The area of most concern is the opioid epidemic that is afflicting New England including the State of Maine. We are seeing more serious drug violations and are expecting there will be continued problems in this area. Fortunately, the attention this issue is receiving from our state and national representatives should assist with our collective efforts to combat this recent threat to our communities.

Troop A was able to augment patrol coverage for Lebanon during 2016 with the use of special traffic details for OUI, distracted driving, seatbelt, and speed enforcement. We also continued to partner with our surrounding police agencies to assure that collaboration and information sharing is maintained as an important part of our investigative and preventative efforts for Lebanon.

The Town of Lebanon should also be aware that Troop A now has two canine officers, two troopers on the state police tactical team, one drug recognition technician, one negotiator and one firearm instructor. We also have a number of troopers that are highly skilled in a number of other areas not the least of which is crisis intervention for persons suffering from mental illness.

During 2016 the State Police, Troop A – continued to work with the Selectpersons, community and businesses of Lebanon to assure several annual events were conducted in a safe, successful manner. The collaboration with all entities involved is a good example of assuring the public's safety through cooperation and community partnerships. Working together will assure the upcoming year will reflect our best efforts to keep Lebanon safe.

To this end, I have co founded the Former Governors Caucus, a group of former state executives who are frustrated with legislative gridlock and eager to find bipartisan solutions. And as always, I aim to bridge the partisan divide by hosting barbeque dinners in Washington with colleagues ranging from Ted Cruz to Elizabeth Warren. If you know a person's children, then you see them as a mother or father and not a rival vote, and working to further personal dialogue and build relationships can lay the foundation for successful legislation.

One of the accomplishments of which I am most proud is the legislative victory that protects our college students and their families from an expensive hike in student loan interest rates. In 2013, as students faced a significant spike in interest rates that would have taken thousands of dollars out of their pockets, I brought together colleagues from across the political spectrum to broker compromise legislation called the Bipartisan Student Loan Certainty Act. Thanks to this bill, students will save \$50 billion over the next 10 years by lowering their interest rates, which means that a student in Maine will now save between \$3,000 and \$6,000 over the life of their loan.

Being an Independent in the Senate has allowed me to make calls and vote on policies that are best for Maine, but it has also made it possible to play key roles in finding simple solutions and legislative fixes that make good commonsense to both parties. Of course, much of what we do in the Senate doesn't happen on the Senate floor, or even in committee. Instead, it involves working across all levels of government to ensure the State of Maine receives attention and support from the federal government.

Take, for example, the opioid and heroin epidemic devastating communities across our state. While Congress has passed legislative solutions aimed at expanding access to medical treatment, I've also pressed for other changes that can be accomplished more quickly and make a more immediate difference in Maine. For example, I successfully urged the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to increase the number of patients to whom a doctor can provide medication-assisted treatment, and in 2015 brought the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy to Brewer to meet directly with Mainers and hear their stories. I've also engaged law enforcement – including the Drug Enforcement Agency – to crack down on the production of opioids and work to limit their diversion. Together, Senator Collins and I helped pass the Northern Border Security Review Act to combat drug and human trafficking along our border with Canada.

While the opioid epidemic is certainly our biggest public health crisis, job loss in Maine is still our number one economic problem and that's why we need to focus on bringing good paying jobs back to Maine and protecting the ones we still have. As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I teamed up with Senator Collins and Representative Poliquin to successfully secure a provision in the defense bill that can help domestic shoe manufacturers like New Balance. The three of us also worked together with the Department of Commerce to establish an Economic Development Assessment Team, known as an EDAT, to assist Maine's forest industry in the wake of several mill closures. We have an incredible spirit of innovation and ingenuity in Maine and I believe finding ways to invest in that spirit will reignite Maine's forest products sector and our economy. Part of our economic path forward must also include expanding access to high-speed broadband, which can help connect our businesses and communities to information and economic opportunities.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments.

Growing our economy by encouraging job creation remains a top priority. The tax relief bill enacted during this last Congress contains provisions I authored to provide small businesses with the certainty that they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act includes a provision the Maine delegation worked together to champion requiring that military recruits be provided with athletic footwear made in America, as is required for other equipment and uniform items whenever possible. This is a great victory for our troops and for the 900 skilled workers at New Balance factories here in Maine.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and \$1 billion towards the construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen the Navy and our national security, and the additional destroyer will help meet the Navy's goal of a 355-ship fleet.

Maine's growing population of older individuals creates many challenges. That's why, as Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security.

The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. Last May, a call to the hotline helped lead to the arrest of a national crime ring targeting seniors, and in June I worked to secure the humanitarian release of a Maine senior who had been imprisoned in Spain after being victimized by an international drug smuggling scam.

The Aging Committee also released an extensive report detailing the findings of our bipartisan investigation into the abrupt and dramatic price increases for prescription drugs whose patents expired long ago.

I advocated strongly for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. I also championed and authored portions of the 21st Century Cures Act that will further support biomedical innovation and make significant reforms to our mental health system.

The Senate also took steps in the past year to combat the nation's heroin and opioid epidemic by passing the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA), which I was proud to cosponsor. CARA is a monumental step forward in our effort to address the devastating addiction crisis affecting countless families and communities across the country and right here in Maine.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2016, I cast my 6,236th consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Citizens of Lebanon:

Maine has a long tradition of civil participation in both state and local government, and I thank you for being informed and involved citizens.

My vision for Maine is prosperity, not poverty. For this reason, one of my top priorities continues to be the reduction and eventual elimination of the income tax. Raising the minimum wage is not the path out of poverty: I want Mainers to earn a career wage. Reducing the income tax is the biggest and most immediate pay raise for all hard-working Mainers.

Not only does an income tax cut put more money back in your pockets, but it will also attract businesses that can offer good-paying careers to keep our young people here. It shows the nation that we are serious about wanting people and businesses to come—and stay—in Maine.

Unfortunately, voters approved a referendum question to raise the income tax to 10.15% on successful Maine households and small businesses. Enacting the second highest income tax rate in the country shows the nation we are eager to punish people for being successful. It will drive them out of our state and make it even more difficult to attract much-needed doctors, dentists, scientists, engineers and other professionals to Maine. They can live in neighboring New Hampshire, which takes no income tax from their paychecks. Even worse, there is no guarantee the extra revenue from this tax will go to fund education, as proponents promised.

As successful people leave Maine, state and municipal government will lose the significant amount they pay in property, sales and incomes taxes. This will put even more upward pressure on local property taxes. Municipalities will have to get more creative to provide local services without increasing property taxes. Reforming the tree growth program, collecting property taxes on land in conservation or preservation programs, charging a payment in lieu of taxes on state land that is taken off the property tax rolls and having non-profit organizations pay a two-percent tax on their net revenues are all ways for municipalities to increase revenues.

Dear Noble Community Members,

Our continued focus on literacy is paying dividends, as we are seeing strong gains in the percentage of primary and elementary students meeting or exceeding standards on the state test and on local assessments. As noted last year, the Kindergarten JumpStart (KJS) program is the cornerstone of our work, and we are further refining our KJS Plus program for students in need of significant reading intervention by the end of first and second grades. Working with a consultant, we are changing our classroom practices to reflect the latest research in brain development, and administrators and school-based literacy coaches are working with teachers and educational technicians live, in real time, in the classroom to provide job embedded professional development aimed at fidelity of the intended curriculum.

We have created and continue to embed a vision of strong reading resources and teaching and learning practices across the grade span, Pre K-12. We also recognize that strong writers make for strong readers, so our emphasis on a cohesive programmatic approach to writing is in development this winter and spring. Watch us continue to make strong literacy gains next year as well!

We have recently completed a K-5 science pilot. After examining multiple resources, staff has elected to continue the use of the Full Option Science System (FOSS) kits as the backbone of our instructional offerings. Under the guidance of the Director of Teaching and Learning Heidi Early Hersey, curriculum committees completed a gap analysis to identify necessary unit shifts to better align with the Next Generation Science Standards. This year's budget will reflect a major investment in FOSS kits to enable students to experience the necessary content in exciting new ways.

In mathematics, Noble High School continues to refine Common Core 9, 10, and 11 level courses. At Noble Middle School, teachers are using the Big Ideas resource that is aligned to the Common Core. And, North Berwick Elementary is conducting a pilot of the Eureka math program at the early grades. While our math scores continue to trend above state average, we are certainly not satisfied yet. Students will continue to demonstrate continuous progress in mathematics in the Noble schools.

Tax Club Application

The Board of Selectmen is pleased to announce the initiation of a Tax Club for the 2016 Fiscal Year. The Tax Club allows property owners to pay their property taxes over the course of the year through a payment book that the Town will issue once an application has been completed and the commitment set.

The Tax Club works by evenly dividing the Tax Bill into a number of payments which allows the property owner to pay monthly so long as all taxes paid have been received by June, 2017. The payments will be divided over a nine month period starting in October and ending in June. The start date of October is used due to the setting of commitment by the Board to determine the actual taxes owed by the property owner. The payments are made without any interest charges accruing so long as the payments are received in accordance with the terms of the agreement. The agreement is written to reflect the property owner's budget. If the property owner does not keep up with the payments, then all interest that would have been due must be paid in full.



INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen Town of Lebanon, Maine

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lebanon, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015 and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the Table of Contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Town's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and

fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lebanon, Maine, as of June 30, 2015, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof and the respective budgetary comparison for the general fund for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that Management's Discussion and Analysis, the Schedule of Proportionate Share of Net Pension Liability, and the Schedule of Contributions be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with evidence sufficient to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements. The accompanying supplementary information appearing on pages 44 through 45 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

As management of the Town of Lebanon, Maine, we offer readers this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015.

A. OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the basic financial statements. The basic financial statements comprise three components:

- (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements, and
- (3) notes to financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

<u>Government-wide financial statements</u>. The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of our finances in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The Statement of Net Position presents information on all assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities presents information showing how the Town's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused vacation leave).

Both of the government-wide financial statements distinguish functions that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (business-type activities). The governmental activities include general government, public safety, public works, solid waste, and culture and recreation. The business-type activities include ambulatory rescue activities.

Fund financial statements. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. Fund accounting is used to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds can be divided into three categories: governmental funds, proprietary funds, and fiduciary funds.

Governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a government's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

An annual appropriated budget is adopted for the general fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with this budget.

Proprietary funds. Proprietary funds are maintained as follows:

Enterprise funds are used to report the same functions presented as businesstype activities in the government-wide financial statements. Specifically, enterprise funds are used to account for ambulatory rescue operations.

Proprietary funds provide the same type of information as the business-type activities reported in the government-wide financial statements, only in more detail. The proprietary fund financial statements provide separate information for the ambulatory rescue operations, which is considered to be a major fund.

<u>Fiduciary funds</u>. Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of parties outside the government. Fiduciary funds are not reflected in the government-wide financial statements because the resources of those funds are not available to support the Town's own programs. The accounting used for fiduciary funds is much like that used for proprietary funds.

<u>Notes to financial statements</u>. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

<u>Other information</u>. In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain required supplementary information which is required to be disclosed by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

B. FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- As of the close of the current fiscal year, the total of assets exceeded liabilities by \$6,733,783 (i.e., net position), a change of \$435,596 in comparison to the prior year.
- As of the close of the current fiscal year, governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$2,182,373, a change of \$493,948 in comparison to the prior year.
- At the end of the current fiscal year, unassigned fund balance for the general fund was \$1,548,556, a change of \$422,467 in comparison to the prior year.
- Total long-term debt (i.e., capital leases) at the close of the current fiscal year was \$66,492, a change of \$(8,631) in comparison to the prior year.

C. GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The following is a summary of condensed government-wide financial data for the current and prior fiscal years.



European Naiad in Northeast Pond

The threat: European Naiad (EN)

Northeast Pond, connecting waters and their

surrounding economy and recreation culture face a potential calamity. European Naiad (Najas minor), found in Northeast pond in 2015, is an aquatic plant recognized by biologists and Maine and New Hampshire law as invasive.




This aggressive plant grows and reproduces rapidly and is able to

overtake lakes by shading and outcompeting native vegetation as well as choking lake-bottom habitat. A threat to water quality, dense and widespread mats of EN decay concurrently and are able to deplete dissolved oxygen necessary to support wildlife.

Potential effects of EN invasion include the following:

- fish kills, reduced quality of sportfishing, boating, swimming and other recreational activities.
- decline in surrounding real estate values, and
- rapid proliferation: one-acre infestation generates millions of seeds per year; stem fragments, often with seeds, attach to boats, gear and wildlife.



outcomes in combatting invasive plants. While rapid response does not guarantee eradication, it does, at minimum, reduce the environmental impact and associated social costs of infestation.

Rapid response: Mechanical and

Efforts to mechanically remove EN using a professional Diver Assisted Suction Harvester in 2016 proved that the invasive species was especially well established. The infestation was beyond the capacity of these mechanical removal efforts, leaving EN poised to infest other regions of the impoundment. An early autumn survey reveals EN in downstream Spaulding Pond although the degree of infestation remains to be determined.

The application of diquat dibromide (trade name: Reward) is the most effective management option for the dense and extensive beds of EN, with the objective of limiting further spread of EN and preventing new seed formation.

DEP considers herbicide treatment only in the rarest of circumstances when other control options are less effective and when the risk of aggressive spread is imminent. Application of diquat dibromide by a commercial applicator certified and licensed by the Maine Board of Pesticides Control may be recommended by DEP in 2017 for the following reasons:

- acceptable risk to humans through drinking water, acceptable risk to fish and wildlife
- most manageable environmental fate; i.e., fast breakdown in water column, least mobility through substrate and soils, and
- greatest efficacy for desired control of dense growth of European Naiad.

Final recommendation for breadth of treatment will depend on plant survey results next year.
